UNIVERSITY OF LEICESTER THE MOST AFFORDABLE STUDENT DESTINATION FOR SECOND YEAR RUNNING

- The University of Cambridge moves into the top ten
- The Universities of Edinburgh and Leeds move up the top ten most affordable list

The University of Leicester is the most affordable destination in Britain for first-year students for the second year in a row, according to research from HSBC. The research – which looks at the cost of studying at universities in the top 20 British towns and cities with the largest student populations – shows that first-year students in Leicester can expect to spend £192 on average per week. This includes rent in halls, weekly essentials (such as food, activities and university supplies), a weekly bus pass and beer and wine.

The University of Leicester is cost effective thanks to relatively low living and accommodation costs, and beat its costs per week on last year: £192.07 vs £196.47 in 2014. Meanwhile, the University of Cambridge moves into the top ten (from 13th place last year) and the Universities of Edinburgh (6th in 2014) and Leeds (8th in 2014) move into the top five.

Cost of living falls for second year students

University accommodation plays a significant role in the cost of studying for first-year students. Only four university destinations offer self-catered accommodation at an average of less than £100 per week: the Universities of Leicester, Cardiff, Newcastle and Edinburgh. The University of Leicester has the most affordable self-catered accommodation costs at an average of £81 per week, although the University of Cardiff is not far behind at £88.

However, once second year students move into private rented accommodation, the cost of living begins to fall. The University of Liverpool tops the list of most affordable second-year student destinations, with weekly costs of £174. This leaves last year's winner – the University of Leicester – in second place at £179 per week.

The only destination which sees the cost of studying rise for second-year students is London. An expensive private rental market means second-year students in the capital will pay an average of £355 per week (compared to £318 for first-years).

- Cost of weekly essentials obtained from current financial guidance on university websites. Includes cost of food, activities, university supplies etc. Travel and accommodation costs have been excluded where applicable
- Self-catered accommodation costs from university websites. Based on the average price for a standard room. Where multiple accommodation options are available, an average has been used
- Student rental accommodation from www.accommodationforstudents.com and Rightmove Students. The average weekly rent has been used.
